#### **BUDAPEST KEY FACTS**

- Capital of Hungary
- Historically Budapest was two cities separated by the Danube: Buda and Pest
- The city was formed in **1873** by merging **Buda** (the hilly, historic side) and **Pest** (the flat, urban side) across the **Danube River**.
- You can still feel the difference Buda is quieter and scenic, while Pest is lively and full of cafés and nightlife
- 9 Universities
- The Hungarian Parliament Building is the third largest in Europe and a UNESCO World Heritage Site

#### THE ACADEMIC SIDE OF ERASMUS

- Check the schedules and deadlines for course registration and semester dates early, some universities may apply fines for later registration
- Be careful: semesters might start at different times in your host country -> can overlap with the exam period at FAU!
- Check the courses that the faculties offer and possible limitations for courses from other faculties, e.g. the faculty of mechanical engineering only allows 10% of your ECTS achieved to be from other faculties
- You can usually find a catalogue of the courses offered in English on the University website and speak to the coordinator from your department at FAU about which courses can be transferred
- Take a look at the requirements for the course: do you have the required knowledge from previous courses, midterm or final exams, ECTS, available for Erasmus students...
- Credit transfer was really easy










- Rented room via housing anywhere

- Rent usually between 300-550€





#### STUDENT LIFE

- Welcome Week to get to know the city and the campus and a lot of info about the paperwork required, course and exam registration
- Erasmus Student Network offered many activities like Pub Crawls, a trip to Margaret Island, trips to neighboring cities and Croatia...
- Provided information about public transport, bike rentals etc.
- Erasmus Life Budapest offers discounts if you're a member for bars, restaurants, flights etc.
- Sometimes a little hard to get out of the Erasmus Bubble



#### Erasmus Student Network







- Money provided was sufficient, also due to many discounts as Hungarian student
- You can get the Hungary Pass (like Deutschland Ticket) for approximately 5€/ month if you have a Hungarian Student ID
- Bike rental for 4€ a month


